Pastor's Corner

Ephesians 3

¹⁶ I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, ¹⁷ so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, ¹⁸ may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, ¹⁹ and **to know this love that surpasses knowledge**—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

In our current times, we want to become knowledgeable, to be in charge of whatever direction we are going. And yet this Scripture tells us that Christ's love surpasses knowledge. We cannot learn more than what Christ can do as He dwells in our hearts, in our faith. Are we allowing Christ to dwell in our hearts?

Insecurity arise so often, as we try to be assured of making the right decisions in our lives, in work, in health, in our church. There are so many unknowns. Things are not the same as they were a year ago in any of these areas of life. So allowing Christ to give direction may be easier than thinking we HAVE to know and be RIGHT!

How do we 'let' God guide our paths? How can we integrate God into our decision making? Does it mean we give up all knowledge? First, God wants you knowledgeable, to be aware of your environment and current happenings. Then ask God to enter, help us to understand, to move forward in thoughtful ways and to allow our faith to inspire and direct our decision making. Finally, breath in God's Spirit and listen to what comes out. God gives us messages when we focus, come to God and allow God to enter.

That is what is happening in the church right now. Time to gain some information, listen to others, gather facts, ask questions in this process of looking for new partners in leading the church forward into the future. In this whole process, bring God to enable you to understand and process information in the most positive thinking. Finally, breath in God's Spirit and listen to what comes out, what you feel is right, what gives you peace. God is in the process with you and will enable you to make the right decisions, when you allow God to lead.

We've had a year together to reflect on where you came from, the history of North Valley. Then we sought out Vision words and created goals to go with them. And now we are gathering facts of what process to move forward with. God is leading and guiding you to have peace in the process. KNOW that God's Love is greater than all our knowledge. Peace be with you. —Pastor D.

From the Parish Nurse—Racism is a Public Health Crisis in Wisconsin

Background

Years of work led by grassroots groups, community-based organizations, government agencies, academic leaders, and many others have laid a strong foundation to address racial inequities in Wisconsin. In October 2017, the Mobilizing Action Toward Community Health (MATCH) Group, of the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute, convened statewide partners at the inaugural Healthiest State Agenda Setting Meeting. The convening supported the collective identification of six statewide health equity priorities, one of which was to declare racism a public health emergency. In May 2018, the [Wisconsin Public Health Association \(WPHA\) passed a resolution](#) declaring that racism is a public health crisis in Wisconsin and committed to taking action. Building on this work, several partner organizations have worked together to transfer the WPHA resolution content to this Racism is a Public Health Crisis Sign-on. The goal is for organizations and individuals to [sign-on to the declaration](#) and commit to actions that are tailored to their specific contexts.

We agree that Racism is a Public Health Crisis and commit to take urgent action because:

- Race is a social construction with no biological basis.
- Racism is a social system with multiple dimensions: individual racism is internalized or interpersonal and systemic racism is institutional or structural, and is a system of structuring opportunity and assigning value based on the social interpretation of how one looks, that unfairly disadvantages some individuals and communities, unfairly advantages other individuals and communities, and saps the strength of the whole society through the waste of human resources.
- Racism causes persistent racial discrimination in housing, education, employment and criminal justice, and an emerging body of research demonstrates that racism is a social determinant of health.
- More than 100 studies have linked racism to worse health outcomes.
- In Wisconsin, the highest excess death rates exist for African Americans and Native Americans at every stage in the life course and our infant mortality rate for infants of non-Hispanic black women is the highest in the nation.
- The American Public Health Association (APHA) launched a National Campaign Against Racism.
- Healthiest Wisconsin 2020 states that, "Wisconsin must address persistent disparities in health outcomes and the social, economic, educational and environmental inequities that contribute to them."
- Public health's responsibilities to address racism include reshaping our discourse and agenda so that we all actively engage in racial justice work.
- While there is no epidemiological definition of "crisis," the health impact of racism clearly rises to the definition proposed by Galea: "The problem must affect large numbers of people, it must threaten health over the long-term, and it must require the adoption of large scale solutions."

JUSTICE AND JOY – Resolutions from the Synod Assembly

Last month in our Resolutions update, we discussed Anti-Racism.

Some people might say that this is not a church issue... but Christ would say it is. Christ loves all his children equally and it hurts not to see everyone treated equally. It is a justice issue that God feels is troubling for all of us. Mostly because we don't see it, don't understand that we are doing anything wrong!

I guess that is why we need to talk about it. We can't change behaviors unless we name them and talk about them...it is in-grained in our memory banks and hard to change. Think about how hard it is to say Administrative Assistant instead of Secretary. Comes out wrong half the time. Same with our discussions about race.

Each congregation is setting aside a time each year to reflect on how racism, implicit bias, and privilege impact their own life together.

In order to get a few conversations started, we thought posing one question to discuss each Sunday during our coffee time might help us to understand.

Five Minutes only. Not taking all your visiting time. Simple questions that have no wrong answers but make us aware of what we think.

Week 1: What characteristics do we attribute to various races? Do you think all in the race are the same?

Week 2: Were conversations about race a part of your upbringing and how was the subject approached?

Week 3: Do we desire people of color to "act White"?

Week 4: How does our defensiveness keep us from truly listening to people of color?

There are rules to discussion. Only state your own thoughts, listen to others, do not interrupt, do not bring political points to conversation; this is a time to reflect on race.

We are only becoming aware of what we think and how that might affect race equality.

Finish in Prayer for continued openness and understanding.

Can we start this on Sept 22 and do it for 4 weeks and see how it goes?
